Goths, Gargoyles & God: The Building of the Magnificent Medieval Cathedrals

At the turn of the millennium in 1000 AD, European churches were small, dark, thick-walled, and dingy. Less than two hundred years later churches were large, spectacular architectural wonders, rising over two hundred feet in the nave, airy and lit by glorious colored glass windows the size of tennis courts. Today, these glorious medieval cathedrals and churches still soar above the European cities



for which they are the center of the community and the focus of tourism, architectural renown, and Christian worship. What happened to make this frenzy of church building so marked and spectacular? Presented by Dr. Richard Benfield, CCSU Professor Emeritus of Geography, this session will look at the early antecedents of medieval church building, travel to Great Britain and France to examine how these churches were built to such grandeur. Join this virtual discussion with Dr. Benfield as he shares the finest examples of these Cathedrals across England and France.





Avon Library's **geothermal HVAC system**, installed during the renovation and expansion project in 2012, has experienced multiple failures over the past five years and will be replaced with a more conventional and robust version of geothermal technology this year.

Work began in February with the removal or trimming of several trees on the library's grounds and fencing going up around the work site, which is on the south side of the library building and along the Sunnybrook Drive side of the grounds. Crews are now digging the bore holes for our new geothermal wells.

While this work has occurred outside the library, there will also be extensive work inside the building, predominantly in the basement and attic. Every effort will be made to avoid impacting library programs and services during this project, but inevitably there will be some disruptions that may require a change to library operations. When possible, that will be communicated in advance.

A Rift, not the River, made the Farmington Valley: the Geology of Western Connecticut Along US RT 44

Thursday, April 8, 2021 @ 7:00 pm (via Zoom)

Presented by Howard Wright, Renbrook School Science Department Head. This will be a first ever photographic journey focused on the geology of Route 44 in western CT and adjacent areas. Understanding the geology of the area will help everyone "read" the local landscape with greater awareness and appreciation of why early people came here.

Connecticut Before History: The Story of Human Settlement of the Farmington Valley

Thursday, May 6, 2021 @ 7:00 pm (via Zoom)

Presented by Dr. Ken Feder, Archaeologist, Central Connecticut State University. The Farmington Valley was originally settled by human beings more than 10,000 years ago. The Farmington River Archaeological Project, led by Feder, has revealed remains of the villages, hunting encampments, and quarries used by these first settlers. Much in the way the police investigate the scene of a crime, archaeologists locate, recover, and examine evidence that reveals the scene of a life lived in the past. Feder will discuss some of the sites his crews have excavated and share the stories that can be told of the lives of the people who lived, worked, and died in those ancient Farmington Valley communities.
