


<u>The First Conspiracy: The Secret Plot to Kill George Washington</u> by Brad Meltzer and Josh Mensch



<u>George Washington's Secret Six: The Spy Ring that Saved the</u> <u>American Revolution</u> by Brian Kilmeade and Don Yaeger




1776 by David McCullough

Founding Brothers: The Revolutionary Generation by Joseph J. Ellis



Alexander Hamilton by Ron Chernow




The Ride: Paul Revere and the Night that Saved America by Kostya Kennedy

<u>Lafayette in the Somewhat United States</u> by Sarah Vowell



The British are Coming by Rick Atkinson



The Fate of the Day by Rick Atkinson




The First Salute by Barbara W. Tuchman


The Unknown American Revolution by Gary B. Nash


<u>The Cause: The American Revolution and its Discontents, 1773-1783</u> by Joseph J. Ellis


America's First Daughter by Stephanie Dray & Laura Kamoie


The Secret Wife of Aaron Burr by Susan Holloway Scott


The Fort by Bernard Cornwell


My Dear Hamilton by Stephanie Dray & Laura Kamoie
